BIOGRAPHIES OF THE AWARD RECIPIENTS BY DONITA BANKS

RITA JO TENSLY CHAPTER RECOGNITION CERTIFICATE

Rita Jo was initiated into Sigma Chi Chapter at the University of Miami in Florida in 1948, where she received her Bachelor of Music degree. She later earned a Master of Music degree from DU. Rita Jo has served our chapter as President and as Treasurer, and was the Phlea Phlam chairman for the 1997 Denver National SAI Convention. She has also chaired many committees including the Incorporation Day luncheon and the Roses-in-Winter Dinner. Last year she served as the chairman for the successful Mending Faces benefit concert. Rita Jo holds the Sword of Honor, the Rose of Honor, the Wreath of Achievement, a Chapter Recognition Pin, and 50 and 60-year membership certificates. For six years she served as National "Tempo" director, was on the committee to nominate national officers, has presented a workshop at national convention, and has had an article on composition published in *Pan Pipes*. Her original song, "Celebrate SAI", was a contest winner and was included in the Centennial Supplement to the Songs of SAI, published in our 2003 Centennial year. Martha holds the Sword of Honor, the Rose of Honor, the Wreath of Achievement, the Rose of Dedication and a 50-year membership certificate.

SIGMA ALPHA IOTA NATIONAL CONVENTION REPORTS JULY 23-27, 2015 AT THE ST. LOUIS UNION STATION HOTEL

My claim to fame is that I was the only Xi C convention goer who drove to St. Louis. I did a sightseeing road trip through Kansas and Missouri, ending in St. Louis. I also transported all the picture puzzles and badge buddies the Denver Alumnae chapter would sell for Phlea Phlam. All the driving and sitting in the car ended up giving me rather severe lower back pain, so a Dr. in St. Joseph gave me some meds for it. The pain plagued me all through the convention and limited some of my participation. I would like to share the highlights for me at the convention. This was the first time I have attended an SAI national convention.

We were treated to marvelous vocal and instrumental music at every general session, at the Welcome Luncheon, and at the Dinner of Honors. We also heard a wonderful piano concert by Elaine Fukunaga on Saturday evening. Each performer was an SAI and an excellent musician in her craft. The Strolling SAIs sang "Grace" at the two dinners and sounded very harmonious.

Another highlight for me was playing in the Region I Handbell Choir directed by Tessique Houston, a Province Officer from California. We performed many familiar SAI songs such as "The Whistle Song," "Pan Canon," "SAI Philanthropies, Ink," and several other tunes. We performed at the Sunday morning session and were enthusiastically received. Four of us, Anne Kleve, Kristin Rousom, Tula Roberge and myself were from Xi C. Edie Marshall, Regional Officer, played beside me and directed our final piece, the "Chorale." This was the first time an all SAI handbell choir has performed at convention.

Phlea Phlam was quite an experience for me. I was amazed at the quantity, variety and creativity of the items offered for sale by all the different chapters. Kristin and I set up our things and took turns minding the table and shopping. Sigma Upsilon shared a table with us and sold a cookbook they had created.

It was a thrill to have our Province Officer, Anne Kleve, elected as the new Region I Officer. Because of a snafu with the new electronic voting system, the announcement wasn't made until the Dinner of Honors on Sunday evening, so we had a long wait for the news but are very thrilled for Anne. Newly elected Province Officers were also announced and Patricia Krus is now our Xi C Province Officer.

The Union Station Hotel was an amazing venue for the convention and handled the large number of participants very well. The customer service was exceptional and the rooms very comfortable. The lobby which was the former waiting room for trains has a high arched ceiling, and in the evening a light show was performed on the ceiling with accompanying music. It was fun to sit and watch the show.

Because I missed the first part of every general session and didn't go to any sessions on Monday, I will let others share about those. Non delegates had to sit in the back of the huge ballroom and sometimes it was difficult to see and hear what was going on. I missed the workshops because we had handbell rehearsals, so can't really comment on those. I did enjoy visiting with fellow SAIs, as well as the highlights described above, and am glad to have experienced a national convention.

SIGMA ALPHA IOTA NATIONAL CONVENTION REPORTS CONTINUED JULY 23-27, 2015 AT THE ST. LOUIS UNION STATION HOTEL

REPORT BY KRISTIN ROUSOM, DENVER ALUMNAE DELEGATE

The 2015 SAI National Convention was held July 23-27 at the St. Louis Union Station DoubleTree Hotel in St. Louis, Missouri. There were nine SAIs from Xi C Province, including four Denver Alumnae members: me, (Kristin Rousom, president and delegate), Linda Rolf, VP-Ritual, and Rita Jo Tensly and Janet Williams, former presidents. Other attendees included Anne Kleve, Xi C Province Officer, Jackie Gessert, Sigma Upsilon president and delegate, Michal Garner, Alpha Phi president and delegate, Tula Roberge, Boulder Alumnae president and delegate, and Stina Branson, Boulder VP-Membership.

The hotel itself is worth mentioning, as it is the St. Louis Union Train Station that has been renovated and upgraded into a spectacular hotel, a DoubleTree by Hilton. The main lobby was once the original train waiting area and now contains a full-service bar, a small market place with a Starbucks (of course!), and the ceiling has lights installed around the edges which change color throughout the day. The hotel had the lights set to red all day Thursday, just to welcome the SAI Convention attendees. Every night from 5pm to 11pm on the hour there are computer generated light/movie shows that leave the lobby packed with guests who come out to have a drink or bite to eat and stare up at the ceiling. It was fabulous!

Most of the attendees arrived on Thursday, but those who checked in earlier in the week, were blessed with not having to wait for an hour or more to check in. A computer glitch prevented the hotel from checking anyone in until around 1pm, and the line grew rapidly. Convention registration, as always, went very smoothly. The fraternity's official jeweler and the new official merchandising company, The Whistle Shop, were open all day and throughout the weekend for SAIs to buy guards, jewelry, clothing, and pretty much anything SAI you can possibly imagine (you can follow The Whistle Shop on Facebook, if you'd like to keep up with their products).

Initiation took place Thursday evening, with a pledge class of 9. Following the initiation ceremony, a local dance band provided a grand reception for all SAIs along with cookies provided by the hotel.

Friday morning was the official start to the Convention, kicked off by a trumpet fanfare, written by Friend of the Arts, Michael Braz, and organized by me (Denver Alumna delegate Kristin Rousom). There were a total of 7 trumpeters from chapters all over the country, mostly non-delegates. The theme for the Convention, Voices of Experience, Voices of the Future, permeated the proceedings, particularly in keynote addresses and musical performances, which were spread throughout the general sessions. The first general session was comprised mostly of formalities and election business, including roll calls, introductions, rules adoptions, and nominations from the floor. Following the first general session, the Welcome Luncheon introduced the Convention Honoree, Former National President Virginia (Ginny) Johnson. The remainder of the day consisted of the second general session, candidate introductions for the National Executive Board, and the Inter-American Music Awards Concert in the evening.

Saturday was basically SAI Philanthropies, Inc. day, starting off with Phlea-Phlam. Denver Alumnae was situated right next to Sigma Upsilon and only one table down from the Boulder Alumnae chapter's table. Denver's table had quite a few visitors, but sadly only sold a dozen puzzles. Badge holders, on the other hand, sold like hot-cakes and few of the small and large sizes remained when it was time to total up the earnings. The chapter donated \$21 to Philanthropies, and brought home \$121 to the chapter.

The third general session opened with a brief sing-a-long by the Strolling SAIs, a Fraternity Education "Fun-damental", and the daily credentials report. The first keynote speaker of the day was John Christopher, one of the Fraternity's lawyers. He spoke on the history of the 1972 Title IX statute, the amendment added in 1974, and SAI's history with them. CONVENTION REPORT BY KRISTIN ROUSOM CONTINUED

The remainder of the session bestowed National Alumnae and Collegiate Chapter Service Awards, the National Advisor Award, and National Treasurer Awards. The Chairman of SAI Philanthropies, Inc., Sharon Doty, gave a report and introduced the Symphony Society's Circle of Pearls and Pan's Legacy. The Circle of Pearls recognizes those members who have contributed \$5000 or more to SAI Philanthropies.

Lunch was to be on one's own, however, many members of Xi C Province had a very brief meal, and went to rehearsal for the Region 1 handbell choir that was to perform on Sunday. Having had only one short rehearsal on Friday evening between general session two and NEB candidate speeches, the choir had a longer rehearsal. Some members had to choose between attending a workshop and rehearsing a little later on.

Workshop: Growing an Alumnae Chapter

I had the opportunity to attend a workshop presented by Lindsey Hales and Johanna Wolf of the Raleigh/Durham Alumnae Chapter. This chapter was installed in 2012 and had seen tremendous growth during the triennium, affiliating 8 SAIs in the 2014 -15 year alone. They shared with us what they did to get their chapter off the ground, which included quite a bit of information surrounding their website and how to effectively use it as a tool to reach SAIs in the area. Using this information, I have already begun updating our website, and hope to implement some of their suggestions, including allowing all Executive Board members to have log-in ability, an interest form for potential affiliates to fill out, and a means to sell our fundraising items (puzzles, anyone?) that did not sell in person.

Saturday evening members had a chance to meet their Region and Province Officer candidates. Our Xi C Province Officer, Anne Kleve, had the opportunity to present her vision for Region 1 and what she sees as her responsibility as Regional Officer. There was one other candidate for Region 1 officer, who also presented her vision for the position.

After dinner was the SAI Philanthropies, Inc. Benefit Concert featuring Elaine Fukunaga, concert pianist and SAI member. All present were stunned by her performance, which included pieces by well-known composers, such as Chopin and Beethoven, but also lesser-known composer Joaquín Rodrigo.

Elections were held Sunday morning and, for the first time, were conducted electronically. After a few hiccups, which turned out to be due primarily to the available internet access, all delegates were able to vote. Results were not available until the end of the fourth general session for the NEB, and near the end of the Dinner of Honors that evening for Region and Province Officers (See results at the bottom of the page). The remainder of general session four was dedicated to music, SAI Philanthropies' People-to-People Project report, and the presentation of Diamond Swords of Honor. It was during this session that the Region 1 Handbell Choir performed, directed by Tessique Houston with guest conductor Region 1 Officer Edie Marshall for the SAI Chorale. It was the first time that the group had played together with all choir members present, and they did a fantastic job (if I do say so myself). That afternoon attendees had free time until the Dinner of Honors. Presentations during the Dinner included recognition of National Award recipients during the interim years, National Alumnae Chapter Achievement Award, National Alumnae Leadership Award, National Collegiate Chapter Achievement Award, National Collegiate Leadership Award, and the Dorothy Whinery Special Leadership Award, which was awarded to Former National President and Convention Honoree Ginny Johnson. The Boulder Alumnae chapter was awarded the Annelle Chandler McAdams Alumnae Service Project Award.

SIGMA ALPHA IOTA NATIONAL CONVENTION REPORTS CONTINUED JULY 23-27, 2015 AT THE ST. LOUIS UNION STATION HOTEL

CONVENTION REPORT BY KRISTIN ROUSOM CONTINUED

Monday morning began with the final workshop session, followed by the final general session. The musicale for the session was presented by the Strolling SAIs as a short fraternity sing. The SAI Memorial Ceremony was presented by outgoing National Vice-President for Ritual and Fraternity Education (NVP-RFE), Deborah Volker, who also played a brief violin piece in memoriam of those members lost during the past triennium. The new National Objectives for 2015-18 were presented by Michelle Ingram, chairman of the National Objectives Committee. The Resolutions Committee made its report before the new National, Regional, and Province Officers were installed and the Convention was adjourned, possibly for the first time ever, an hour ahead of schedule.

Workshop: History of the SAI Ritual

Outgoing NVP-RFE Deborah Volker presented a brief history of the SAI Ritual to a completely packed room. A closed workshop, Deb and former NVP-RFE Leslie Nelson took the handclasp and password from all entering. Deb began with a disclaimer and reminder that while we were about to see pictures of older editions of our beloved Ritual, no copying was permitted and only those ceremonies found in the current edition were to be used by chapters. This fascinating workshop more or less chronicled Deb's research while she was updating the most recent edition of our Ritual. She showed us how so many of the quotes we know from Ritual today were included by the Founders in the earliest handwritten Ritual, likely penned by Elizabeth Campbell herself. She went on to show us pictures of other editions, equipment no longer used, and described certain set-ups that are also no longer used, but many members do still remember from their own initiations. It was suggested by Leslie Nelson that for Fraternity Education chapters could hold "pretend initiations" using older forms of the Ritual, so that current members could experience what some of our older sisters did when they were initiated. Deb also told attendees about a thought that she had come up with while searching through all the old Ritual materials at National Headquarters. Her idea was to create a "Members Only" room at NH where visiting sisters could, with the handclasp and password, view these old documents and items. While budgeting options did not allow for its creation, many sisters present eagerly asked if there was a way that chapters and members could help to raise money to have this room created. Deb said that she would pass the request along to the NEB and we should wait to see what comes out of it. Hopefully, there will be an initiative within the next three years to begin raising money for this room. I am certain that many, many sisters would go out of their way to visit NH, if only to see such a room and the treasures which it would contain. I know I would.

THE HISTORY OF SIGMA UPSILON CHAPTER

During the fall quarter of 2006, several music students at the Lamont School of Music decided that they would like to be part of Sigma Alpha Iota. At that point in time, they had to become a colony first. They had to meet several other qualifications, and finally they had to have 15 members who would be willing to go through training, pass the test, and go through the initiation ceremony to become an SAI chapter, as well as for the members of the colony to become members of Sigma Alpha Iota. That happened in May of 2009. The last president of the colony was present alumnae member Kelly Sowell. The members had a choice to become a brand new chapter with a new name, or to have the Sigma Upsilon chapter re-installed. It was decided to re-install Sigma Upsilon, which had been a chapter at the Lamont School of Music some years ago and had gone inactive. When it was decided to reinstall Sigma Upsilon, the original Charter was sent to Denver and it is now in the possession of the present chapter.

Since the reinstallation of Sigma Upsilon there have been six presidents in the last 6 years, 2009 through 2015: Erica Erivas, Rebecca Wilson, Sarah Cambidge, Kelsey Popovich, Theresa Kesser, and Sonora Dolce. There have been 56 members initiated into the chapter in the last 6 years.

There have been 6 initiations during the last 6 years. This spring, on April 1, nine new members were brought into the chapter. On April 8, a musicale was held, featuring several members as well as several of the brand new Sigma Upsilons. On May 29, the Honors Convocation was held. Dr. Kristin Taavola, the new faculty advisor to the chapter gave out the 2 Sigma Alpha lota awards, the Honors Award, and the Scholarship Award. As Dr. Taavola said, it is a rare occurrence when the same person wins both awards, but it happened this year. Chapter President, Sonora Dolce won both awards. Sonora also won the award for Outstanding Performance of a student of composition, as did Jackie Gessert. Sonora also won the Frank Toth Memorial award which came with a check for \$250.

Theresa Kesser won the Dorothe Garrett Carrillo Award for the Outstanding Graduating Female Vocalist which came with a check for \$1,000. We are all very proud of all these wonderful winners.

On May 31, the Senior Commitment Ceremony was held, at which time the Denver Alumnae Chapter gave graduation cords to the 4 graduating seniors: Sonora Dolce, Theresa Kesser, Katerina Therianos, and Haley Zulkowski. Three of the four graduates will be back: Sonora Dolce and Katerina Therianos will be in Graduate School and Theresa Kesser will be in a Certificate Program.

July 23 – July 27 was the Sigma Alpha Iota National Triennial Convention in St. Louis. The new President of Sigma Upsilon, Jackie Gessert, was the delegate from Sigma Upsilon, and Sonora Dolce also attended the convention. August 2 was the Denver Alumnae 's outing to the Central City Opera. This year, Jackie Gessert won the drawing for 2 free tickets to the opera.

We know that Sigma Upsilon will continue to flourish and we hope that they and the Denver Alumnae Chapter will continue to have a real connection.


ROSE SISTERS REPORT BY DONITA BANKS
