# MAY SISTER OF THE MONTH

#### Anna Maria Amador Manalo

Anna Maria is the co-founder of a professional chamber orchestra in New York City and has served in a variety of musical endeavors as a violinist, pianist, teacher of special needs adults & children, church music director and orchestral member (from the age of 12). On May 20, Anna Maria performed as principal second violinist with the Millennium Chamber Symphony, which she helped co-found in the late 1990s and which was reorganized for that special concert of American music in a Lincoln Center auditorium in honor of White House concerts performed during the Kennedy years from 1961-1963.

Here's more that you should know about this talented SAI musician:

BEGINNINGS: My parents emigrated from the Philippines as newly-weds to attend college in St. Louis, where I was born; my father became a doctor and my mother, a teacher; "Amador" is my mother's maiden name and my parents called me "Pumpkin"; I grew up in Madison, Wisconsin, with two sisters; at age 3 my Mom gave me a toy piano which I loved; that sparked my interest in music and instruments: I began piano lessons at age 7 and violin lessons at age 9.

EDUCATIONAL/MUSICAL BACKGROUND: I earned a Bachelor of Music degree in Piano Performance from the University of Wisconsin in Madison, studied composition at the Manhattan School of Music and earned a Master's degree from Hunter College; I was a church music director in Brooklyn for nine years, taught music students in Harlem, played in orchestras and performed throughout the NYC area; I have been a freelance musician, composer and teacher of special needs students in several cities.

FAMILY: I met my husband, Stefan Pukatzki, in NYC and married him in 2000; Stefan is a prominent microbiologist who emigrated from Germany and studied at the University of Maryland and later at Harvard University and the University of Chicago; we left NYC in 2000, lived in Boston and Edmonton, Alberta, and Chicago briefly before moving to Denver last fall.

CURRENT INTERESTS: I'm teaching special needs pre-schoolers at the Maestro Music Institute in Arvada, playing duets with Donita Banks and doing accompanying; I enjoy reading, building robots (really!), traveling, movies and learning about Colorado history.

SAI BACKGROUND: I was initiated into Rho Chapter at the University of Wisconsin and a member of Madison Alumnae Chapter for one year; I am honored and excited about being a part of Denver Alumnae Chapter as a performer and new secretary for 2017-18; my favorite parts of SAI membership are our sisterhood ties and serving others through music.

Her fabulous accompaniments, including playing for a world premiere song, "Be Brave" by Kevin Padworski, had us bursting with pride.

Here's more about our talented "Sister of the Month":

BEGINNINGS: I grew up in Dayton, Ohio, in a family that included my parents, an older brother and a younger sister; my parents still live there and I see them as often as possible; from the time I was little, I loved to pretend playing the piano that lived in my house; at age 4, I started asking my mom for lessons and we found the only place in town that would start teaching a four-year-old.

EDUCATIONAL/MUSICAL BACKGROUND: I earned a Bachelor of Music degree in Piano Performance from the Lamont School of Music at the University of Denver, in 2014; my most amazing collegiate experience was my semester abroad during my junior year in Vienna, Austria, where I studied at the IES Vienna Institute; I currently hold these positions—Staff Pianist and Music Librarian for the Colorado Children's Chorale, accompanist and handbell choir director at Calvary Baptist Church, Denver, and accompanist for the Colorado Symphony Chorus; I also have four private piano students.

SPECIAL MUSICAL ADVENTURES: In the summer of 2016 I traveled to Europe with the CCC Festival Singers for concerts with the Colorado Symphony Chorus in Paris, Strasbourg and Munich; my most memorable moment was visiting Eglise de la Madeleine where Gabriel Faure was organist and led the premiere of his beloved *Requiem* in 1893; this spring I flew for 15 hours to Australia to accompany the CCC Tour Choir in two weeks of concerts in Melbourne, Bairnsdale, Canberra and Sydney; I especially loved Canberra, the capital city, and the concert we performed in a small town named Buchan for our best audience in an unassuming but awesome community hall; we also toured some beautiful caves near the town.

FAMILY/SUMMER PLANS: My boyfriend of two years, Taylor, and my wonderful rescue dog, Vincent, a 6-year-old husky/shepherd mix; if I were an animal, I'd be a dog, and hope I could be as unconditionally loving as Vincent is; my summer plans include playing at schools and other venues where CCC has partnerships.

SAI BACKGROUND: I was initiated into Sigma Upsilon Chapter at DU in 2012 and served as V-P Programs my senior year; I affiliated with Denver Alumnae Chapter fall, 2014; I presented the program at our 75<sup>th</sup> anniversary celebration in March, 2015, and performed on the musicale in June, 2016; my favorite parts of being an SAI—our philanthropic work, our sisterhood ties, being a Rose Sister and the sing-alongs!

The tour will commemorate the 500th anniversary of the Reformation and the choir will perform concerts and recitals in sites important to that event, begun by Martin Luther on October 31, 1517.

Music performed will include American music such as Wondrous Love, All My Hope, Ride on King Jesus, as well as Ubi Caritas by Ola Gjeilo and Wana Baraka by Shawn Kirchner, and a composition written by Adam Waite, Minister of Music at Montview Presbyterian Church, Dona Nobis Pacem.

As a dean of a leading online university, Dr. Janet Williams is committed to educating working professionals looking to transform the world. At Walden University's Richard W. Riley College of Education and Leadership, Williams heads a 21st century learning community seeking to affect positive social change. Walden has more than 100,000 alumni from 150 countries.



She oversees the School of Education and Professional

Licensure. Her role includes program, personnel, and policy development and evaluation, as well as budgeting and long-term planning for student success. Under her leadership, Walden launched the nation's first online competency-based master's program in early childhood studies using a direct assessment model.

As dean, Williams is accountable for outreach to districts, schools, and state departments of education. Her enthusiasm has broadened with the development of a unique three-tiered partnership model to enhance relationships for students during their field experiences. She said her passion in education ignited when she "realized the positive influence education has on helping others achieve their goals and the impact of those actions for social change in our world." As a woman leader in the educational sector, she identifies the "desire to make a difference" as a key component of leadership. "Women can and should empower each other through collaboration across allied fields," she said.

Prior to her tenure at Walden, Williams served as associate dean at the University of New Orleans and director for teacher licensure and assessment for the Louisiana Department of Education, before relocating following the devastation of Hurricane Katrina.

the National Council of Teachers of Mathematics, International Society for Technology in Education, Association for Supervision and Curriculum Development, American Educational Research Association, a local chapter of Kiwanis International, and several charities for scholarship programs and hospitals. She has also served as a national evaluator for the U.S. Department of Education Office of Innovation and Improvement for leadership and alternate certification programs.

Among her many accolades, Williams has been recognized as a Florida regional teacher of the year, district mathematics teacher of the year, and member of a team recognized as innovators of the year by New Orleans City Business for opening the first university-managed charter school in the city.

She holds a bachelor's degree from the University of Mississippi, a master's in education from Rollins College, and a doctorate of education from the University of Central Florida.

Music Together is a *phenomenal* early music education program for children ages 0-5 - yes, she even has a 14-week old little boy in one of her classes!

## XI C PROVINCE WEEKEND MARCH 4-5, 2017






Colorado Springs Alumnae

#### IN LOVING MEMORY Stephen W. Banks 1937-2016

My husband, Steve, loved to sing and had a lifelong passion for choral music. His real interest in music began at Media High School (a suburb of Philadelphia, PA) where his wonderful music director, Grace Porter, introduced him to choral singing. Steve was also the baritone in an award-winning male quartet, The Storytellers, who performed throughout the region during his senior year in high school (1954-55). Steve and I met as members of the University Choir at CU-

Boulder in 1956 and we were married in 1959 in my home town of Pueblo, Colorado. He and I sang in the Chancel Choir of Lakewood UMC for many years and for the past six years as members of Charles Wesley Choir at St. Andrew United Methodist Church in Highlands Ranch. Steve also loved his years as a member of the Classic Chorale and the Colorado Symphony Chorus. We attended many CSO and Colorado Children's Chorale Concerts over the years and he could often be seen at SAI events, most recently our "Swing into Spring" dinner on March 12.



Stephen Walter Banks was born in Milwaukee, Wisconsin, spent his childhood in Portland, Oregon, and graduated from Media High School. He earned degrees in electrical engineering and business at CU-Boulder and began a 32-year career at "Ma Bell" (U. S. West, now CenturyLink) in 1960 as an engineer and network manager. He later earned a Master's Degree in Business Administration from CSU. After he retired, Steve did volunteer work in the community and pursued his hobbies of collecting vintage cars, building radio-controlled airplanes and operating amateur radio devices. He loved spending time with his family, vacations at our cabin near Grand Lake and monthly breakfasts with his former work colleagues. We lived in Lakewood for 56 years and our home in Westgate for 45 years and shared a lifetime of wonderful experiences.

Steve had a hard fall on our driveway on October 30, 2016, with a traumatic head injury followed by two months of treatment and rehab and some measure of recovery. However, complications from an infection and diabetes (a 35-year struggle) contributed to his decline and death at a Lakewood care center on December 29. A beautiful memorial service was held at St. Andrew UMC on January 4. In addition to myself, Steve is survived by sons David Banks (Jennifer) and Gary Banks (Calisa Tucker), daughter, Julie Stiegemeyer (Scott) and nine grandchildren.



# IN LOVING MEMORY Dr. JoAnne Ingeborg Kyh

Dr. JoAnne Kyhl was a violist, conductor and composer of numerous vocal, choral and instrumental compositions. She earned a master's degree in music with the viola as her major instrument and fine arts from the University of Texas, Austin, in 1954. She received a PHD in composition from the University of Minnesota. JoAnne also spent a year in Vienna, Austria, studying viola and composition.

JoAnne was born in Cedar Falls, Iowa on September 2, 1931. Her musical instruction began on the piano from the age of 6 with her mother, an accomplished pianist and organist. She often improvised at the piano, which prompted her younger brother John to say, "Jo is playing some of that home-made music again. Make her stop!" A relative had an unused violin which JoAnne tried and liked, later switching to the viola. She began



her violin studies at age 11 at Iowa State Teachers College (now the University of Northern Iowa). Her first violin teacher had been a pupil of the great Belgian virtuoso Eugene Ysaye. Many years later, JoAnne was able to trace the ancestry of her violin teachers and link them with Viotti and Kreutzer.

JoAnne held college teaching positions, played in orchestras and ensembles and sang in choral groups throughout her life. Her compositions were performed on numerous occasions by church and community groups and often for programs for the Denver Alumnae Chapter of Sigma Alpha lota international music fraternity. In 2011 JoAnne was admitted to the Sigma Alpha lota Composers Bureau on the strength of performances of her music by professionals in professional concert venues. An entry about her work has appeared in the American Composers issue of *Pan Pipes*, the fraternity publication. JoAnne also presented a workshop at the 2012 National Convention of SAI in Atlanta.

JoAnne was initiated into Beta Xi Chapter of Sigma Alpha Iota at the University of Texas, Austin, in 1954. She affiliated with Denver Alumnae Chapter in 1973, serving as Vice-President-Programs, Secretary, Treasurer and Editor as well as on the Scholarship, Honors and other committees and as an alumnae advisor for Eta Kappa college chapter. For almost 25 years, JoAnne, along with Delta Omicron member, Judy Eidson, was co-chair of the annual Panhellenic Musicale which featured performers from SAI and DO. For many years she also organized and directed a small choral group who performed several selection on the musicale. JoAnne and Judie often selected a theme for these eclectic, excellent concerts: Russian Music, Italian Music, Music and the Muses, Musical Treasures from Eastern Europe, American Music in Rhapsody and Verse, and Shall We



Dance?. JoAnne was a member of the SAI Singers, who performed her cantata, "We Are the Daughters" on two programs in 2002. She cherished her SAI sisters and the musical opportunities available as an SAI member for over 60 years. JoAnne was awarded the Sword of Honor, the Rose of Honor, a chapter recognition pin and two certificates of excellence.

Mary Louise Bailey, a former member and Past President of Denver Alumnae Chapter, passed away on November 29, 2016, in Ponca City, Oklahoma. She had celebrated her 80<sup>th</sup> birthday surrounded by family and friends at her home in Tonkawa, Oklahoma, on November 5. Mary had surgery on November 17 and passed away due to complications on November 29. A service was held at First

Baptist Church, Ponca City, on December 5.

Mary was born on October 17, 1936 in Tonkawa, Oklahoma, where she grew up and graduated from high school in 1954. She attended Oklahoma Baptist University, graduating with a Music Education degree, and followed that with a Master of Arts in Vocal Performance from Colorado State University. Mary taught elementary music, private piano and voice lessons for 35 years in 5 states, moving as her husband Roger Bailey's engineering jobs demanded. When it was time to retire, they moved to her childhood home in Tonkawa, where she was active in her church music program, PEO and DAR. Mary loved to travel—her last trip was an Alaskan cruise last summer with three family members.

Mary was initiated into Alpha Eta chapter at Oklahoma Baptist University in 1955. She affiliated with our chapter in 1981 and was active until the family moved to California in 1985. They returned to Colorado in 1996 and Mary served on committees and as a board member, performed as a pianist and singer and was a member of the SAI Singers. The chapter thrived under her leadership as President from 1999-2001. Mary was awarded the Sword of Honor in 2000. Nancy Ruth Bailey, one of Mary's four daughters, was active in our chapter from 2011-2013 then moved to Tonkawa where she still resides. Marywill be remembered for her dedication to SAI and her fun, outgoing and loving spirit.


